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Minutes of July 12, 2021 General Membership Meeting

Attendees: President Michael Bell, City Council Member Karen Hiller, TPD Ofc. Matt Wilson, Property Maintenance Officer Carlos Hernandez, Emma Ray, Leroy Wedeking, Judy Billings, Zachary Scott, and Donald Fortin.

President Bell called the meeting to order at 6:31 p.m.

<u>Community Policing Report</u>: Ofc. Wilson gave the report. He said that while crime was up in Topeka, including more shootings and more juveniles committing crimes, there was no crime spree going on in Tennessee Town. Wilson spoke on "Stand Up 4 Life," a new grassroots nonprofit formed to stop juvenile gun violence formed in the California Ave. area of East Topeka. He said former perpetrators have been asked to be involved.

There was discussion on domestic violence crimes and the need to look for holistic solutions to crime.

Wilson said the legislative and judicial branches are catching up with the need to have mental health professionals available to assess and diffuse situations.

Emma Ray led discussions on excessive fines and how they don't lead to reforms.

There was discussion on diversion programs being successful in other cities to keep people out of the criminal justice system, particularly for those committing crimes for the first time.

<u>Property Maintenance Officer Carlos Hernandez</u>: Hernandez said his department is short on personnel right now. He said Tennessee Town is being toured right now. Discussion occurred on 1032 SW Buchanan and 1142 SW Washburn (the owner of the Washburn address is trying to get rid of the house). Discussion occurred on the garage at 1181 SW Clay, where donating it was suggested.

Adoption of Agenda: Donald Fortin moved approval of the July 12, 2021 meeting agenda with the change of moving the property maintenance report to the second business item on the agenda. Zachary Scott seconded the motion. The motion was approved.

<u>Approval of Minutes</u>: Fortin moved approval of the May 10, 2021 meeting minutes as presented. Scott seconded the motion. The motion was approved.

<u>Acceptance of Treasurer's Reports</u>: Fortin moved acceptance of the support budget and Envista reports. Judy *Billings seconded the motion. The motion was approved.*

Fall Neighborhood Cleanup: Ray moved to hold the cleanup from Fri., Oct. 22 through Sun., Oct. 24, 2021. Leroy Wedeking seconded the motion. The motion was approved.

Fortin moved locating a dumpster at 1153 SW Lane and at 1195 SW Clay (SW 12th and Clay Streets). Ray seconded the motion. The motion was approved.

<u>2020 Neighborhood Health Map Update</u>: Bell led the discussions and expressed his concerns about how the data had been collected, including a report in meeting packets. Karen Hiller said she also had concerns about the health maps. Bell said he had voiced his concerns to planning and development staff.

<u>2021 National Night Out Event</u>: Bell said no one had stepped up to coordinate the event this year after the pandemic made SafeStreets cancel it in 2020. He suggested that the NIA do something related to what the event is about during the weekend of the neighborhood cleanup. The 1st Church of the Nazarene was suggested as a possible partner. Fortin said he'd like to see if the NIA could still hold an event on its Aug. 7 date. Bell asked Fortin to follow up with SafeStreets Judy Wilson to see if there was still time to hold an event on Aug. 7.

Old Business: City Council Report: Karen Hiller gave the report. She talked about the upcoming vote on the city budget and how the body was working not to implement a property tax increase. She also said that Neighborhood Initiatives Work Group member Mike Spadafore had expressed concerns that rehab program eligibilities had changed.

Old Business: Citizen Advisory Council: Fortin gave the report. He spoke on Dr. Gianfranco Pezzino's presentation on housing and health and Planning and Development's Dan Warner and his presentation on the neighborhood health maps. He spoke about the Enhancement Program, which he and Bell are working on as CAC members, and the CAC ordinance revisions that had been brought back to the body for clarifications.

Old Business: International Academy, Topeka JUMP, Momentum 2022 Updates: There were no reports.

<u>Kudos</u>: Surviving the pandemic: kudos to us all.

<u>Announcements</u>: Neighborhood Relations Programs, TOTO first-time homebuyers' assistance program, and Habitat's Aging in Place Program.

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Grocery Oasis Update:

The Central Topeka Grocery Oasis (CTGO), a group of neighbors organized more than three years ago to reestablish a full-service grocery store in Central Topeka, is proud and excited to announce that it has welcomed to its board of directors two new members and an intern who will help the group to achieve its goals.

The two new board members are Kathleen Link and Tobias Schlingensiepen. Link is the executive director of Positive Connections, which provides case management services for people living with HIV and AIDS. Link has been at Positive Connections for nine years and works with seven other staff members to serve the community. Link said that many of her group's clients live in Central Topeka and would benefit from the creation of a new grocery store.
